Ralph J. Scott Fireboat

AACA members, along with our friends, have been invited to participate in the 90th birthday celebration of the famed Ralph J. Scott Fireboat. Originally named Los Angeles City No. 2, she was built in 1925 at the Todd Shipyard in San Pedro. The \$214,000 fire boat went to sea with a crew of 14 officers and firefighters. She was later renamed the Ralph J. Scott in honor of the city's most innovative Chief engineer during the early 1900's. When built, she was powered by seven 350-horsepower, 6-cylinder in-line Winton gasolines engines. Retired in 2003, she now sits up in a cradle allowing viewing of this 99-foot long national historic landmark.

We may be able to see the new 105-foot Fireboat #2 in action. It is the world's most powerful fireboat featuring the most modern marine firefighting technology, a medical treatment area, powerful engines and the fortitude to stand up to 24-hour use.

Plus, we have the pleasure of touring the fire museum and an exclusive, private tour of the non-operational city jail and courthouse. In addition to its obvious use, the courtroom was also the setting for all the Perry Mason TV courtroom trials.



Robert Pritchard picked up his college sweetheart, Ginger, from the airport in his dad's Oldsmobile in 1956. Following a 40-year absence, Pritchard reunited with Ginger. She fell in love with him, and the car.

Robert Pritchard's black 1954 Oldsmobile convertible has graced films like "Walk the Line," served as a backdrop for posing pinup girls and been the subject of hundreds of double takes while cruising down the road.

The Oldsmobile cost \$3,802.80 cents when his father bought it brand new. It's given Pritchard a lifetime of memories.

It even helped win him the heart of his college sweetheart he hadn't seen in 40 years.

"Do you remember that old hoopty?" Pritchard asked Ginger after connecting with her again in 2003. How could she forget? Pritchard drove the car to Newark, New Jersey, to pick her up at the airport in 1956.

"I still have it," he told her.

She didn't believe him. He mailed a photo of the car to her in California where she was living. It wasn't long before Pritchard packed up the 1954 Oldsmobile S-88 and followed her to the West Coast from Mississippi. She fell in love with the car. She fell in love with Pritchard.

For a while, it was like old times. Pritchard and Ginger would take the car to Big Bear, Palm Springs and car shows around the state.

"We had 10 good years," Pritchard said. That was until Ginger died last year.

Pritchard reaches for a photograph he keeps near the steering wheel. There's Ginger, grinning ear to ear while in the driver's seat. It was her first reunion with Pritchard and the car.

"She loved the car," he said.

Pritchard's Oldsmobile was just one of hundreds of racers, rat rods and classic cars lining the streets of Solvang's Village Center on Saturday during the 11th annual Wheels 'n Windmills Car Show.

Lining the street were rows of impeccable show cars, waxed and rubbed down with baby diapers. Some, no doubt, loaded onto trailers and hauled to the Solvang show, the owners fearful of a stray rock or pebble scratching the paint.

PEBBLE BEACH & THE MONTEREY PENINSULA VINTAGE CAR WEEK AUGUST 10 – 16

This is the week for anyone with a weakness for cars. Old, antique, offbeat, custom, replicas and new, this is your place. The smell of hot exhaust, hot tires and breath taking hot air surrounds. These are the events that Sharon and I attended. There were more than we could find time to get to. If you go, and I suggest highly that you experience this, plan your events ahead and plan where you will stay LONG AHEAD. Such as putting your name on a list NOW. We have attended the last three years and are on the special reserved list at our hotel -- such status.



The first event we attended was the street show in Carmel on the Tuesday. Exhibition is by application only or you have to know someone or your car should have some celebrity status. This is a varied collection. This year they honored Shelby Mustangs. I have never seen so many and heard so many. From street to race they were there. Other cars on display ranged from a 1958 last Packardbaker coupe that has been in the same family since new to the Gary Wales Creature.

This year marked the 100th anniversary of the drive taken by Edsel Ford from Detroit to San Francisco in a Model T. On hand was that exact Model T and it was again driven on the same route. To give more authenticity, just as Edsel did, they also did not use Interstates. Both drivers were present for pictures. They were dressed in period costumes from 1915. Edsel was famous for taking this drive and in his honor, Ford Corp. named a car that went on to be the biggest marketing disaster in its history. Maybe they should have called it the Model Z. The event went on until 5:00 and gave out many trophies and had the announcer from one of the Velocity Channel programs.

Wednesday saw a mini change, the Micro Car Show in Pacific Grove. Three blocks of the downtown were lined up end to end with small and micro cars of all types. The huge creativity in designing so many tiny cars is enormous. Included were many MGs of many years. OK, they are not really mini cars but I wasn't going to make a big deal of it. There were many Minis as well. Pacific Grove is a beautiful town inbetween Carmel and Monterey. Drive six blocks and you are in Monterey. It has beautiful accessible beaches and charming restaurants without the crowds of Carmel.

Thursday morning and afternoon is the parade and display of the Pebble Beach cars for that Sunday. You get to see the cars as they finish their 50 mile cruise around the area. I staked out my viewing spot where they make the turn onto Ocean Avenue just before they park. At that point their owners dine at a private party in the adjacent park and we can gawk for about 2 hours at the cars. Several cars had stickers that identified them as having just driven 1500 miles from Kirkland WA to Carmel. I staked out my spot about 90 minutes before the cars arrived. The crowds grew exponentially from then. At one point two men, easily in their 70s, got into a loud spat because one accused the other of pushing in. Neither cared a bit that they both pushed in front of me. One threatened to punch the other in the face! At my urging (OK, yelling very loud) a cop came over and cooled them down. For two hours we get to walk around the cars, no ropes or anything, just lots of open and concealed security. We bumped into Betty and Howard Green, too.

Thursday evening is the Cruise-In at the Mexican restaurant (I'll never forget what's its name) on Carmel Valley Road. It is about two miles east of Highway 1. Hard to miss, it is filled with cars of all types and descriptions and they come and go as they wish. The restaurant is VERY crowded but there is an outside Bar B Que that is easy to get to and has lots of seats. The crowd is very friendly. The place is decorated in car memorabilia.

On Friday morning as members of the Petersen Checkered Flag group, we were invited to attend a special breakfast at the Bonham's auction. We ended up staying for the entire day's auctions. At one point an MGA came up. I watched a twentysomething girl right in front of us bid it up to \$70K! Obviously she won it. \$70K! REALLY? Earlier in the day a curious auction occurred. A 1953 Chrysler Imperial limousine came up without reserve. The auctioneer started at \$40K. No bids were offered. Instead of lowering the opening as is normal, he never dropped the ask. It left without any bids. Seems very odd to me. There was another show in Pacific Grove Friday afternoon. We didn't attend. There is also a street show in Monterey on Cannery Row on Friday. It is primarily modern sports cars with lots of young guys and their testosterone revving them up.



Concours de Lemons

Saturday is the show of opposites. The Concours de Lemons. Held in a park in Seaside on Saturday morning is an unruly collection of awful cars, beaten up cars and almost anything else that can get there. Car accessories and memorabilia is available for sale. The best part is the trophy presentation. It starts around noon or earlier or later or when they decide to start. The organizer hands out hysterical prizes that seem to come from the 99 Cents Only Store. Categories vary by the car or whatever he decides, even at the last second. His presentation combines ad lib comedy and droll comments. This is the only presentation I watch and record in total. He also openly accepts bribes in front of the crowd. The bribes consist of what seems to be of equal caliber to the prizes. Admission to display follows the same rigorous scrutiny of the show. There is no entry fee, no application form and the deadline is when the show ends. As long as you can get it there, one way or another you are welcome. I have even seen cars that were going to be displayed at Pebble Beach's Concours the next day. You never know what but are always delighted and amused and occasionally repulsed. This is a not to be missed experience.

The Pebble Beach Concours on Sunday we did not attend. We drove home. Six days was enough. Yes, we are booked for next year. We have tried to attend the vintage car races but have not yet made it. They are reported to be wonderful. They get collections of cars racing that have not been together for decades. And other races.



There are more shows. The Quail Lodge is the grandest of all and may cost nearly a grand to attend. Also the Ferrari show and the Italian show and, and, and other invitation only shows and about five more auctions with cars of incredible worth down to the Russo and Steele and the Mecum Auctions with cars that others can afford.

To see it all you must split yourself into two people. Otherwise plan for what you REALLY want to see, then what you sort of really want to see, then shows that you can attend if you have the time, etc.
