


KENT BROWNING COLLECTION



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#### Mc CORMICK'S SPRING AUCTION

The McCormick's Spring Auction was held at the Palm Springs Convention Center on February 22-24. It was a beautiful day but attendance was lower than usual because there were so many roads into Palm Springs closed because of flood damage. I managed to get in on Highway 11 and that was down to two lanes. The Friday free day had many great vehicles going up for auction. My favorite car that day was a beautiful 1956 DeSoto Seville Firedome. It is powered by a 330 Hemi and a push button automatic. It sold for \$20,475 which seems like a bargain for such a beautifully restored car.

The following is from the McCormick's web site with highlights from the Spring auction:

- The highest sales included a fully loaded 2018 Airstream Interstate 3500 RV camper van with 2,170 miles, which sold for \$128,000.
- A 1987 Porsche 930 with 3.3 liter Turbo engine with 23,000 miles sold for \$89,250.
- A 1963 Chevrolet Corvette split window coupe with a four speed manual transmission and a 327 engine sold for \$81,900.
- A 1991 Chevrolet Suburban, formerly owned by the estate of comedian Red Skelton with 14,000 miles, sold for \$28,350.
- The next auction will be held November 22-24 and the public can get in free on Friday, November 22.

#### CLASSIC AUTO SHOW



#### HOW NEW TECHNOLOGY CAME TO THE AUTOMOBILE

Wealthy folk always owned the house with gas when others were cooking on wood stoves, had gas lighting when the rest had kerosene lamps, brought in electricity when the neighbors were still lighting gaslights and so the story goes, right out to the garage where the new car was parked. If the guy next door had an open top car the rich fellow had roll-up windows, if his neighbor had oil or carbide lamps the well-off had Edison electric lights and as time went along the latest-and-greatest gadgetry and inventions were always present in the nicest cars at the annual automobile shows worldwide. This is the story of how technology came to the automobile.

Case in point: by now most everyone knows about Willis Carrier inventing refrigeration in 1902 which dehumidified air and stopped food from spoiling. But it took Packard in 1939 to move the compressor to the engine compartment to make it commercially available in automobiles. Now you practically can't buy a car without it even in cold climates. Score a big one for the classic car owner way ahead of the outsiders. Their Bishop and Babcock Weather Conditioner was a major hit that year at the 1939 Chicago Auto Show. The cooling coils (evaporator) located behind the back seat along with the fan moved the cool air to the passengers first.

Silent film star Florence Lawrence laid some claim to the invention of mechanically activated brake/turn indicators but didn't patent it however P.S. Douglas-Hamilton did in 1909.

Braking Alert Lights or Stop Light(s) were not common at all in the early years; the lack of electricity to power them and kerosene (or carbide) wasn't able to be adapted of course. Thomas Edison and Henry Ford were notorious pals and when Henry presented Tom with a Model T along with a mechanic to keep it running, Tom reciprocated with electric lighting, batteries and more. In the early 1920's the Philadelphia Storage Battery Company (aka Philco) made good vehicle batteries (Edison had those awful wet cells) and companies like Atwater Kent made ignition and other items plus switches that would permit sensing of the brake pedal movement so we were on the way to making something to warn the tailgater we were slamming on the binders.

Now things started to move fast and Edgar Walz patented a turning signal consisting of a light with two arrows and a brake light in 1925. This was quickly followed by Oscar Simler in 1929 who patented a similar device:

Joseph Bell in the late 30's made it flash and finally it was Buick who made them a standard feature in 1939.

**Trafficators** were a cool invention common mostly in Europe and you didn't have to own an expensive car to have them. You just had to be able to install the cables with which to pull them or install the pneumatic lines to activate them. So you can imagine how few car owners wanted to go through that headache in the days before auto electricity.

The author's 1953 Mercedes 170Da was supposed to have them according to the wiring diagrams but the car got cute little British-made turn indicator lamps instead possibly while visiting the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth enroute to America.

Patterned after the Royal Bavarian Railway signal arms from the 1890's they claim first auto use in 1902 but had to wait until 1908 for Barrachini in Rome to add electric lighting to them. Volkswagen and many other cars also had them. They were the butt of jokes in Hollywood escapades knocking pedestrians off of sidewalks and the like. They fell into disfavor with the gendarmerie over not being all that visible and were often supplemented with other signals to be allowed just to keep them on the car as "original equipment".

The fact that by 1928 only 11 states had vehicle code requirements for stop lights made these somewhat slow to be adopted but the venerable hand-signals persist to this day regardless of the weather. Who knew they would still be mandatory on driving tests 90 years later eh? Cars have evolved but the DMV apparently never did.

**Buick** was the first U.S. automaker to offer factory-installed flashing turn signals. Introduced in 1939 as a safety feature, the new-fangled gadget was advertised as the "Flash-Way Directional Signal" operated from a switch on the new "Handi-shift" column-mounted shifter. The flashing signals only operated on the rear lights.
